THE CHURCH'S CHANT OF JOY

Let the word of Christ dwell in richly, teaching and vou admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns spiritual songs. thankfulness in your hearts to God. Colossians 3:16

The church of Jesus Christ chants the Word of God in the divine liturgy of the church. "Chant" comes from the Latin word "Cantus," which means song. To chant is to sing or speak the word of God on musical tones.

The ancient Psalms of the Bible were intended to be chanted by the

people of God in the congregation as they proclaimed the Word of God and sang his praises. This practice continued into the New Testament era.

The early church developed chants for the people and pastor, culminating in the great Gregorian chants.

Martin Luther maintained the liturgy of the Christian church and extolled the value of the chant to emphasize and make distinct the Word of God.

To chant the Psalms and liturgy is to mark the space for the holy work of worship. Chant of people and pastor has the power to mark the boundaries of sacred space. It is a marker that is heard with the ear and is not heard anywhere else but in the church. We are brought to the same page, the same moment, and the same purpose as the chant marks the space.

Chant marks the text for the holy work of worship. Chant marks the text of liturgy as sacred, as belonging to God and holy. It is not casual conversation nor a lecture. The difference in tone and chant communicates a great deal and is a profound message to the hearers. It marks the text as the very voice of God.

Chant teaches through repetition. The chanted word becomes a vehicle as it impresses upon our memory the Word of God. It is a ritual bond between the words and their tone or music.



Chant marks the action of the Just as the tone has movement, so does that movement describe the movement within the text. Chanting the Alleluia verse for the Gospel indicates action as we greet Christ and His Word. The Words of Institution set apart the action of Christ in the Upper Room as he instituted the sacrament of his body and blood.

The church's chant is not meant to entertain. Perhaps this is why chant is so misunderstood by some in the church. We can tend to lump in chant with personal

musical taste and preference as if it is a matter of what pleases you or touches you emotionally. But chant is music and text that communicates the sacred Word of God. It aids the actual text both in projecting the voice and setting aside the voice from the text so that the focus is not on the singer, but upon what is sung.

Chant is the voice of worship, allowing many people to join together in chanting "Glory be to God on High, and on earth, peace, goodwill toward man..." or "Lord, Now Lettest Thou Thy Servant Depart in Peace..."

The reverential character of the liturgy has certainly been aided by God's gift of chant to communicate the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Oh sing to the LORD a new song, for he has done marvelous things! Psalm 98:1

Cantate Domino canticum novum, quia mirabilia fecit Psalm 98:1 (Latin)

With the church on earth and in heaven, we sing the new song as we chant the praise of Christ Jesus who has redeemed us from our sins and made us His people in holy baptism, as we receive His gifts in Word and Sacrament daily and richly.

What else can we do but chant his praise and glory now and always in heaven. Why do we chant?

All of us who live in the Chico area have been affected in one way or another by the Camp Fire. It will take us a long time to work through everything but in all things God will give us counsel and guidance.

The same is true for helping your children. From your very youngest to your teenagers almost ready to leave the nest, there will be questions, emotions, behaviors that you and they may not know how to deal with let alone understand as you work through coping with this situation and the ramifications.

Concordia Publishing has a series of 24 books called "God I Need to Talk to You About..." written in child-friendly text and illustrations with Scripture



examples to help in application. While these are written primarily for the nursery/preschool/early elementary level, these can be a starting place for family discussion. Here is a picture of one:

While there is not one that specifically talks about disaster, disaster often brings out other behavior in our children and even in ourselves that seems out of character.

The books can be ordered on Smile.Amazon or from Concordia Publishing. If you go to the CPH site and click on "God I Need to Talk to You" you can click on the link to "look inside" for an example of the format.

Talking with God is a good place to start!



Not to shut the barn door after the animals have gone but going through a disaster often makes us take stock of the reality of life with lots of "what if" questions.

For many the most immediate connection to family and friends during the recent Camp Fire was via our cellphones whether that was text, email, social media, etc. We were able to find out who was safe and where they were located even if it took a few hours.

Our technology brought early relief in the way of clothing and other basic needs through Orphan Grain Train. The sight of the Parish Hall filled with boxes piled high was truly astonishing and overwhelming.

Pastor Jordan received a booklet called "Mercy in Action: A Guide for Pastors in the Midst of Disaster." Looking at the Table of Contents there is information for "Before a Disaster, During a Disaster and After a Disaster." There is much to learn and apply so over the course of the next 2-3 months we will be looking at how we should employ our technology to help us both now and for the future.

HYMNS THAT SING OF CHRIST: LSB 700 "LOVE DIVINE, ALL LOVES EXCELLING"

Love divine, all loves excelling,
Joy of heav'n to earth come down!
Fix in us Thy humble dwelling,
All Thy faithful mercies crown.
Jesus, Thou art all compassion,
Pure, unbounded love Thou art;
Visit us with Thy salvation,
Enter ev'ry trembling heart.

Breath, O breath Thy loving Spirit Into ev'ry troubled breast;
Let us all in Thee inherit;
Let us find Thy promised rest.
Take away the love of sinning;
Alpha and Omega be;
End of faith, as its beginning,
Set our hearts at liberty.

Come, Almighty, to deliver; Let us all Thy life receive; Suddenly return, and never, Nevermore Thy temples leave. Thee we would be always blessing, Serve Thee as Thy hosts above, Pray and praise Thee without ceasing, Glory in Thy perfect love.

Finish then Thy new creation,
Pure and spotless let us be;
Let us see Thy great salvation

This much loved hymn by Charles Wesley first appeared in *Hymns for Those That Seek and Those That Have Redemption in the Blood of Christ*, published in 1747.

While some have construed certain expression in

stanza 4 as reflecting the Wesleyan doctrine of Christian perfectionism, these should be interpreted at one and the same time that we, as Christians, through the blood and righteousness of Christ are both saints and sinners.

Charles Wesley (1707-1788)born at Epworth, Lincolnshire. England. In 1721 he was elected to a Westminster studentship Christ Church Oxford. College, where he earned Bachelor and of Master Arts degrees as well as becoming a fellow. With George Whitefield and later his older brother



John, he formed the Holy Club and established its discipline of methodical work and worship that led to the nickname "Methodists." In 1735 he received deacons' and priests' orders. He, in the company of missionaries and his brother John, set off for the new colony of Georgia, U.S.A. where he served as secretary to General Oglethorpe. He returned to England in 1736. He died in London a priest of the Established Church.

Charles Wesley is unsurpassed both in the quality and quantity of his hymns. He left no less than 6,500 of them. We have several of his hymns in our hymnal.



The tune *Hyfrydol*, which means "pleasant" or "good cheer" was written by Rowland H. Prichard (1811-1887) when he was but twenty years old. It is a strong simple tune for which he is noted. He wrote over forty other tunes.

Pritchard was born at Giaenyn, near Bala, Merionethshire. In 1880 he moved to Holywell to be a loom tender's assistant at the Welsch Flannel Manufacturing Company's mill. When he was

thirty three, his *Cyfaill* y *Contorium* (*The Singer's Friend*) was published which was composed of his own compositions.

CAMP FIRE DONATIONS

Students of Walter Hays School in Palo Alto, California sent donations for Camp Fire survivors via teachers, Jessica Tolerba and Kathleen Bransfield. The teachers drove up from Palto Alto on Sunday, December 23 to deliver their contributions. The students worked hard and were so excited to be able to help our Paradise families.





Contributions continue to come in to our Camp Fire Relief Fund daily from all over the country. The California - Nevada - Hawaii District contributed \$30,000 in Fire Relief Funds which were distributed in \$500 increments to sixty families. In addition, the LCMS Disaster Relief Response contributed \$5,000 in \$100 Visa gift cards. Orphan Grain Train sent eight pallets with boxes of clothing and hygiene kits, as well as a cash contribution of \$25,000. Hundreds of individuals and many churches across the country have contributed generously to aid survivors of the devastating Camp Fire.

A total of \$137,359 and counting has come in to the Camp Fire Relief Fund, not including gifts given directly to Our Savior Lutheran Church, Paradise and Pastor Merrick. So far, \$21,463, in addition to the CNH's \$30,000, has gone to support Camp Fire survivors, leaving a balance of \$115,895 available as needs arise. Untold numbers of physical contributions along with gift cards have been distributed, as well.

A tremendous thank you goes out to all who have given of their time, talents, and resources to ease the devastation of the Camp Fire survivors.
