How About Some Order in the Church?

The opposite of order is chaos. In matters of worship, there must be liturgy. And so, it is right that we consider hymnals, rubrics, church year calendar, and other things that bring order to the Divine Service.

The temptation, of course, is to tamper or change the orders that we have been entrusted with. We are not like little children who simply do what we want in the church. We need to be careful, or we will break it.

Everybody seems to agree that the Lutheran Church today is a shadow of what they were supposed to be. One parish has contemporary services. Another parish has a pastor who does not wear vestments and does not preach from the pulpit. Still another has a praise brand and screens on the wall behind the altar. What is going on? Where is the unity and standing together in doctrine and practice?

There are so many divisions and groups within the LCMS that it boggles the mind. Where is the doctrinal and practical discipline from our LCMS President and District Presidents?

The early church informs us that the first councils met to deal with doctrinal and practical threats to the unity of the Christian faith. Creeds and confessions were the result of agreements. The bishops of the church were then obligated to enforce and apply the decrees to the churches and pastors under their supervision.

The glue that held the church together was not an organization or a synod, but a common liturgy, which supported the common confession of the



Word of God. The text of the liturgy is directly from Scripture and therefore the liturgy is a confession of Holy Scripture.

Today, there are many threats to the unity of the church as is very evident on Sunday morning in many churches of the LCMS and within greater Christendom. We need not panic, but ought to remain faithful and realize the church will not disappear, for it belongs to the Lord.

We need to identify that which corrupts and disturbs the unity of the church. What the church needs today is a liturgical reformation, which may seem odd to many. But, consider how man-centered, rather than Godcentered much church music and services have become. We are often told that this is just expressiveness of belief. But this self-centered, ego-driven worship leads away from Christ and causes much disunity in the church.

We receive salvation by grace, through faith, for Christ's sake. We cannot merit nor earn God's favor by a certain way of worship or even by a certain order.

But, let us keep order in the church for the sake of Christ, that our liturgy, hymnody, preaching, and what is ordered point us to the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. That's why we desire and keep order in the church of Jesus Christ.

"But all things should be done decently and in order." I Corinthians 14:40

Our Memorial Fund grew to over \$122,000, so last fall the Redeemer Council put out a request for potential Memorial Fund ideas from the congregation. The Council received a number of suggestions, so it was time to act! On February 16th, the Redeemer Council met to determine which project(s) to apply the Memorial Funds to. It was decided to start off with replacing the church flooring (carpet). The Council approved \$80,000 for the project and a committee was selected (Board of Trustees) to conduct the activities. To start off, the committee will be meeting with an acoustical engineer in March to learn more about the acoustical effects of different flooring types. The committee will keep the congregation informed during the of selection of materials, so interested members can have an opportunity to observe and comment on flooring types and colors prior to the final decision. This is a large project, so it will take some time to complete. What a wonderful gift to update our Lord's house in His glory!

HYMNS THAT SING OF CHRIST: LSB 708 "LORD, THEE I LOVE WITH ALL MY HEART"

Lord, Thee I love with all my heart; I pray Thee, ne'er from me depart, With tender mercy cheer me. Earth has no pleasure I would share. Yea, heav'n itself were void and bare If Thou, Lord, wert not near me. And should my heart for sorrow break, My trust in Thee can nothing shake. Thou art the portion I have sought; Thy precious blood my soul has bought. Lord Jesus Christ, my God and Lord, my God and Lord, Forsake me not! I trust Thy Word.

Yea, Lord, 'twas Thy rich bounty gave My body, soul, and all I have In this poor life of labor. Lord, grant that I in ev'ry place May glorify Thy lavish grace And help and serve my neighbor. Let no false doctrine me beguile; Let Satan not my soul defile. Give strength and patience unto me To bear my cross and follow Thee. Lord Jesus Christ, my God and Lord, my God and Lord, In death Thy comfort still afford.

Lord, let at last Thine angels come, To Abr'ham's bosom bear me home, That I may die un-fearing; And in its narrow chamber keep My body safe in peaceful sleep Until Thy reappearing. And then from death awaken me, That these mine eyes with joy may see, O Son of God, Thy glorious face, My Savior and my fount of grace. Lord Jesus Christ, my prayer attend, my prayer attend, And I will praise Thee without end.

This hymn by Martin Schalling (1532-1608) was first published in Nurnberg in 1571. This was written as the author himself stated "for the dying." It is the only hymn by Schalling in common usage. It ranks among the classic hymns of Germany according to James Mearns in Julians's Dictionary. It is based on Psalm 18 and 73. Koch speaks of it as "a jewel of the church from the heart of Schalling."

Martin Schalling was born April 21 at Strassburg. As a student at the University of Wittenberg he became a favorite pupil of Philipp Melanchthon. After earning his Master of Arts degree, he became a deacon at Regensburg. In the theological controversies that followed the death of Luther, Schalling found himself at odds with various factions, resulting in his losing his position at Regensburg in 1558. As a deacon at Amberg, Bavaria, he was expelled with other Lutheran pastors when Elector Friedrich III decided to adopt Calvinistic theology in worship. Fortunately, the Elector's son, Duke Ludwig, continuing as a Lutheran, promoted Schalling minister tot he Lutherans at Vilseck. Later, pressed to sign the Formula of Concord of 1577, Schalling refused, considering it too harsh. This resulted in his banishment from the court at Heidelberg and his being confined to his house at Amberg from 1580-1583 when he was finally deprived o this office. Later, in 1585, he was appointed pastor of St. Mary's Church in Nurnberg where he remained until blindness caused him to retire.

The tune, *Herzlich Lieb*, by an unknown composer, was first published in 1577.

EMBRACING THE CHURCH GENERATION GAP

I recently heard that a friend's 20-something daughter had moved to another city. In her first few weeks there, she decided she would give the local Lutheran church a try. Her verdict? The church wasn't much to her liking because the only people there were "old people."

On the one hand, I can understand this young woman's hesitancy to return. We all like to be surrounded by our generational peers. It's more comfortable. Friends and even potential spouses are easier to find among a large group of people close to one's own age. Nobody wants to be a part of what they think is an old or dying organization. Some — for right or for wrong — come to church for an energizing faith boost. When they look around and see mainly gray or white heads, they may (especially if they are young or in the prime of life) feel less than energized and want to look elsewhere.

In a <u>recent study by LifeWay Research</u>, young adults reported that the number one reason they stop attending church is because their life situation has changed. They may go to college or simply move away from home. Out from under Mom and Dad's roof, they have the freedom to sleep in on Sunday morning, and so they do. In light of this, I give my young friend a great deal of credit for at least giving a church in her new city a chance.

What if, however, she had decided to go back the next week? Then the week after that? And the week after that? What might she have found? How could she have contributed to a fellowship of mostly older people? What might the members of that congregation have done for her?

Suggestions for a younger person

If you're a younger person entering a church with mostly older people, I encourage you to give it at least a few months. Make an effort to get to know the people in the church. Listen to their faith stories. Watch the ways in which they live out their

Christianity. Sit around a table with them at a Bible study. Listen closely for words of wisdom. See if they don't love you in ways you never expected.

Bring your youthful energy. Volunteer to help out in ways that might be difficult for those who are older. Bring some friends along with you and introduce them to the members of the church. Ask the pastor how you can help him. Lead a Vacation Bible School or help start a food pantry. Give of yourself—and see just how much you receive.

Suggestions for an older person

If you're an older person who is a member of church made up of mostly older people, and you see a young person walk through the door, welcome her or him with open arms. Introduce her to your friends. Make sure the pastor knows his name. Don't overwhelm her but *do* encourage her to stick around for coffee hour. Tell him about the history of your church and let him know how he can get involved.

Don't make a fuss if she brings her mocha latte into the sanctuary. Don't give him a sour look if he's wearing jeans. Make an effort to get to know the personal details of her life. Show that you care about his vocation and relationships. Get her cell phone number and surprise her with an encouraging text message in the middle of the week. Listen to his ideas about ways to enhance the life of the congregation. Give of yourself — and see just how much you receive.

Embracing the generation gap

Instead of just bridging the church generation gap, what if we embraced it? From both sides? What if both young and old took on the attitude that we can learn from those of the other generation and be enriched by them? What if we cared less about ourselves — our needs, our preferences — and just a little bit more about the others sitting in the pews near us?

What if we all took heed of the words from Proverbs 20:29: "The glory of young men is their strength, but the splendor of old men is their gray hair"? What if we lived out Psalm 148:12-13: "Young men and maidens together, old men and children! Let them praise the name of the Lord, for his name is exalted; his majesty is above earth and heaven"?

40 Days for Life campaigns generate measurable life-saving results. So far, 40 Days for Life campaigns have been conducted in **816** communities in **56** countries. More than **15,256** children have been reported as saved from abortion. Local abortion numbers have dropped – as much as 28%. Post-abortive women (and men) are finding healing and forgiveness. In addition **186** abortion workers have left the industry (Please either read the book or see the movie "*Unplanned*", the story about an abortion worker leaving Planned Parenthood and becoming a pro-life advocate). In each city, more people are getting involved with local life-saving ministry efforts beyond just writing a check for a pregnancy center.

40 Days for Life is a cross-denominational, faith-based effort made up of three key components:

- Prayer and fasting: Inviting people of faith throughout our city to join together for 40 days of fervent prayer and fasting for an end to abortion throughout the world.
- Peaceful vigil: Standing for life through a 40-day peaceful, prayerful, public witness outside
 of Women's Health Specialist abortion business at 1469 Humboldt Road, Suite 200, Chico,
 California 95928 –across from the police station.
- Community outreach: Taking a positive, upbeat pro-life message to all in our city.

All participants are asked to sign a statement of peace in which they pledge to conduct themselves in a Christ-like manner. 40 Days for Life has been endorsed by many prominent national leaders, including Pope Francis, Jim Daley, President of Focus on the Family, Dr. Alveda King, niece of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Father Frank Pavone, Director of Priests for Life.
